6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

As this college is one of the oldest institute in Surat, it has the most senior and expert faculties where majority of the Head of the departments of prominent subjects as Economics, English, Accountancy, Commerce and Statistics are the members of the Board of Studies at Veer Narmad South Gujarat University. These teachers play a prominent role in framing of syllabi for all subjects at University level.

It is necessary to note the significant role of all other staff members also who are a part of the subject committee for restructuring the syllabi for Curriculum Development.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

To help students focus and increase audibility of teachers in class room, amplifier system are installed in each classroom and each faculty is equipped with their own MIC Audio Visual technique of teaching is adopted for which each class is equipped with LCD projectors. This system helps in increasing the impact and effectiveness of teaching.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Apart from regular university exams, the internal examinations are conducted at the college level. The teachers constantly evaluate students performance by organising class presentations on topics assigned to them.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- Teachers registered under the Ph.D. and M. Phil programmes are pursuing their doctoral researches.
- Full support and guidance is provided to all faculty members to pursue their studies with infrastructural library and E-support.
- Participation of teachers in Workshops, Orientation Programmes and Refresher Programmes is encouraged.
- Duty leave is sanctioned to teachers for attending seminars, workshops, faculty development programmes and training programmes.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

Sir K. P. College of Commerce has a proud history as it is the oldest college with valued heritage, infrastructure and enriched library.

Library:

- In the library special provisions are made to preserve old books and journals. Books are hard bound and termite and pest control treatments are carried out whenever needed. Computerised Book Entries, stock taking is done at the end of every academic year and all the students as well as staff members have to return the books issued to them.
- Books for Competitive Exams to benefit researchers, faculty and students.
- Book Bank facility is provided to poor students.
- Online Access of Books / Journals through N-List Programme from INFLIBNET
- Study material is also available in the form of CD's and DVD's.
- A large reading room with 32 separate reading cubicles is a highlight of the college library.
- A separate "Research and Promotion Cell" with 5 computers helps researchers focus on work with Wi-Fi connectivity.

ICT:

- The college adopts policies and strategies for adequate technology deployment and maintenance. The ICT facilities and other learning resources are adequately available in the college for academic and administrative purposes.
- Keeping pace with latest developments in technology, each classroom of the college is
 equipped with projectors. Each faculty member conducts academic sessions on laptops
 with elaborate presentations, documentaries and videos to enhance clarity of the study.
 Power point presentation by students on research projects and assignments are encouraged
 periodically.
- A multimedia Language Lab and Commerce Lab provides opportunities for hands on practical training to students.

Physical Infrastructure:

The college owes an enviable eco-friendly lush green campus with trees, plants and medicinal herbs. There are 20 classrooms fully equipped with technology to aid the students. In addition to this we have a:

Recreational Spaces for staff:-

The college has a spacious and airy staff room with all necessary facilities as a pantry with refrigerator, microwave oven, water purifier, cooler etc.

- There is a separate magazine rack for display of latest magazines, journals and periodicals for the study of teachers.
- A separate LCD television is also set up in the staff room.
- For facilitating research and necessary paper work, a computer with scanner, printer and Xerox machine is installed. Each teacher has been given laptop.
- For the administrative staff, there is a big administrative office established on the campus and all necessary equipments are installed in it. A separate dining space and a refrigerator are also provided for the administrative staff.

Recreational spaces for students:

• There is a separate girls and boys rest room available on the campus. There is a drinking water facility with purifier installed on the campus.

Auditorium:

The 'Commerce Bhavan' is a separate building within the campus where majority of the cocurricular and extra-curricular activities are conducted.

• There is a multi-media hall with 265 seats. Majority of the conferences, seminars are held in this auditorium which is adequately equipped with mikes, audio system, projectors, dias and podium.
